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They Came...They Saw...They Encountered! (con't)

I never thought I would have a privileged experience of living in a convent! As young girls in Canossa Convent Primary School, my friends and I were always curious about nuns: *why do they wear so much, including sockings, in the hot Singapore weather?*

Where do they sleep? What do they eat? How is the convent like (it was strictly out-of-bounds to us)?

Stepping into the convent is almost like a 'childhood dream' come true - absolutely unexpected! - though participating in the ***Come & See*** experience was not to satisfy my childhood questions (which I actually have forgotten). Being drawn to the community prayer life was particularly why I wanted a taste of convent life.

Interestingly, as I approached the Canossian Community, I was greeted by surprise and warmly by a lovely Sister at the bus-stop which I got off to get to the convent. (Actually, she wasn't waiting for me at the bus-stop but her bus - yet God was hidden in our encounter!). Following a brief chat, she said, "You don't have to be a nun, but grow spiritually". Her words brought

tears to my eyes. I felt the touch of God in my soul - like He knows the desire in my heart and put it in words for me: grow spiritually.

What is prayer? I've never known prayer to be giving the heart of Jesus to another. What a gem given to me by another lovely Sister. As I contemplate on this, we can indeed make a difference in someone's lives through our prayers because we give the heart of Jesus to them... what great love! This is deep and more to contemplate on! The community life in the convent is ordinary - cooking, eating, washing, chatting, throwing rubbish, sweeping, mopping, chilling out, etc. Yet at the same time it is extra-ordinary because as Henri Nouwen says, God is hidden in the ordinaries of everyday lives. I'm thankful that by God's grace, He allowed me to

experience the Him hidden in this community of Sisters and their individual lives - manifested in their love for Jesus, their Spouse, the each other in their community (including my two friends and I on this programme), the ministry God has entrusted them and the world."

I started the “Come and See” to catch a glimpse of religious life and a desire to know Christ for who He is, not the myopic view of what I make Him to be, but who He truly is. Did I get an answer at the end of the 8 weeks? Yes and no and so much more. YES...

because God showed me love that was born out of the crucified Christ and intercession of the Sorrowful – the service to the poor carried out tirelessly in “love in humility” by the community of Canossian Sisters to make Christ known.

because He put faces to the Crucified Christ on the cross and the sorrowful mother at the foot of the cross, i.e. faces of people whom He put in my path over the years, to make the connection for me. As for the challenge to see Christ in those who are difficult to love, Sr Geraldine has a solution- When we have search for Christ in the other person and can't seem to find Him, let us be the Christ to them. And to be Christ to others, I finally understand that I have to be “Fully Human”.

NO...

because Christ constantly invites us to enter into a deeper relationship with Him. And as I seek to rest in His love more, I will come to know Him more and more, and be surprised by Him at every turn.

SO MUCH MORE...

it was a time of taking stock of my faith journey and coming to accept my humanness and moving forward to learn to love from this imperfectness.

besides spiritual nourishment, we received much nourishment of physical body too- yummy home-cooked cuisine and cooling tea, and the many interesting and hilarious over-the-dinner conversations (After all, Sisters are fully humans too!)

I am grateful for the experience. The 8-week stay marks the start of another phase of my faith journey. I do not know what is ahead but I know that as I keep walking, I am never alone.
