Out of Africa

Sister Calista comes back to Singapore for a home visit every 3 years from Africa, where her Mission work takes her to the impoverished areas of Tanzania, Malawi and Kenya. She spent the last 25 years there.

She was a guest at the Mass celebrated at SACSS for the opening of the school year and we caught up with her. Her first remarks were "It was a really a moving and touching moment for me this morning coming back to my Alma Mater. Talking about blessings in life, that was another that was added on..." She left Singapore in 1983 for a 4 year stint in Rome after her 12 year career in education here as a teacher for 5 years, and subsequently a principal, for 7 years at SACSS in Middle Road. Many students would recall her firm but soft-spoken nature.

Having come from a staunch Catholic home, where she also has a brother who became a priest, Sr Calista had the full support of her family to get into the religious life. Her inspiration to become a nun came from Mother Adriana Reatto and Mother Joy Shelley who guided her through discerning her journey. Over and above that, she was touched by the acts of compassion and charity as a student in SAC, which attracted her to the vocation as a Canossian Sister. Her choice led her to make her Final Vow in 1970 in Milan, Italy.

I slowly began to have a desire to move to poor countries to help with people who were really more needy.

When asked how she got herself to the hottest continent on the planet, she said that after she read the revised rules of the Canossian Congregation which stated that local sisters may opt to become missionaries where people are of dire need, she wrote to the Mother General to become a missionary to work among the poor.

From 1988, after landing in Kenya, her first stop, she assisted in pastoral and social work empowering village women and sometimes in schools, and has, since the past 6 years done formation work in a Novitiate. Her current work is in the outskirts of Nairobi – Mukuru slum. The environment there is a world of contrast to the luxuries of developed countries. While there are natural beauty spots, fauna and flora; the stark poverty of the people is evident in many form - attire, homes, street-children, beggars, etc.

A typical day in Africa for her begins as early as 4am in the morning. "One works harder in a mission country for many reasons. Limited personnel in the Ministry, distance to cover – especially if you have to go to public schools which are far off," she shares.

So how does she live up to the challenges there and did she ever feel alone? "No - The Canossian community is biggest support in every way – Fraternal life, community prayer, mutual service in the Convent and the ministry. Community is indispensable for Missionary service."

Sr Calista is currently staying in the Canossian Formation House at Lorong Low Koon, and has a few travels planned in the region. She leaves on 28th February for Rome for a 'temporary service' after which may follow a continued missionary service in Myanmar.

Singapore Woman Award Winner 2014



We are proud to feature our former student Lily Goh, 34 - the winner of this year's Singapore Woman Award. Organised by MediaCorp, this award recognises women who overcame challenges to accomplish extraordinary and beneficial achievements in society.

Lily is the founder of ExtraOrdinary Horizons, a social enterprise that promotes arts, culture, heritage and language among the deaf. She was also instrumental starting up a project to empower the deaf in Cambodia.

CAA : Tell us a little about yourself.

LG : I am bilaterally deaf (preferably not to be called Hearing Impaired). I am a social entrepreneur, running Extra Ordinary Horizons (www.eohorizons.com) and am a part-time UNISIM student. I graduated from SACSS in 1997.

CAA : Did you have any memorable moments in SACSS?

LG : In 1995, I remember the moment when I performed the solo song "Happy Mallets" with the Concert Band at Singapore Conference Hall. That was my first time. Yeah, my first achievement! That started to develop my passion in music.

CAA : As the founder of Extra Ordinary Horizons, what is your vision for your social enterprise?

LG : We have set the vision for Extra Ordinary Horizons to create an inclusive society where the disadvantaged attain confidence in their own abilities.

CAA : The Canossian sisters and teachers are so proud of you. What would you like to say to them?

LG : I do remember a few like Sister Anne Tan, Sister Maria Riva. Without the Canossian School for the Hearing Impaired, I won't be the person to win the Singapore Woman Award. This school taught me good moral values. Also, I learnt to be more hardworking, self-initiated and independent. I merely do [the things I do] by following my heart.

Little Miss Sunshine

You will see her bright and early every day, and she doesn't finish work till most of the stairways are locked and rubbish cleared. She is often seen plodding around the school grounds in her petite frame, donned in a colourful tudung (Muslim headscarf) and always smiling – keys in her hands, and nowadays, a walkie-talkie. Those who graduated from SACSS over the past 2 decades will certainly remember this smiley character at school.

Aunty Yanti, as she's affectionately known, has been in the school for as long as SACSS has been at Bedok Ave 4. This year marks her 19th year here as the faithful caretaker of the premises – assisting to prepare event set ups and arrange exam areas, gardening and some general cleaning and basic estate maintenance. Most girls would remember her watering the plants or locking up the auditorium, and pulling down the shutters at the staircases. Her cheerfulness endears her to them.

Yanti appreciatively recalls her earlier years when she was hired by Sr Cecily in 1996. She has worked with 4 Principals over the course of her 19 years here, and remembers fondly the kindness of many teachers too, including the late Mr Quah and several others who have since left or retired.

When asked about what makes her stay in this job for such a long time, she admits that she's very happy here.

"This is like my home, I love everybody and everybody is very nice. It's like family. The girls are very helpful. Some of them even come back and visit me after they graduate. And the teachers & (Canossian) Sisters are all my good friends! They care for me and I enjoy my time here."

Looks like there's going to be another Canossian icon in the making, following the footsteps of Aunty Minnie!
