young professional couple moved Ainto their Lakewood home in 1997 and lived there nearly ten years before they decided to do a major remodeling project beginning in January of 2007. That project would, in essence, be nearly a complete rebuild before the couple and their three children moved back into the home in March of 2008.

The design for the remodel project was started by the late architect Tim Johnson and completed by architect Chuck Levin after Johnson passed away. Levin worked hard to keep the design on the path that Johnson had begun.

The couple had worked with contractor Bruckelmyer Brothers Construction before on some smaller projects, but this was much more extensive, so much so that the family had to move out of the home for over a year while the project was completed. According to the wife, "It was a year to plan, a year to build, and a year to get settled back in."

Ed Bruckelmyer says, "It is always challenging to use an existing structure as your base. Removing the entire existing roof system, ceilings, and many of the interior

walls, adding a third level above, were all part of the 'plan.' The open stairway wrapping around the stone fireplace added some real challenging aspects to the building. A unique overlook from the third level to the entry also added much interest."

Working As a Team

The couple kept a detailed photo album of the steps of the process along the way, and both were very

hands on from start to finish. They knew what they wanted and worked side by side with their team of builders and subcontractors to bring their vision to life.

The wife expresses their great admi-

ration for Bruckelmyer and his crew. "They were really great to work with. My husband and I are very detail oriented, and they were there with us every step of the way with exactly what we wanted." They also worked closely with interior designer Linda Podvin, owner of Courtney and Leigh Interiors, who was very instrumental in many of their design choices. "We were involved from start to finish," says Podvin. "We revised the exterior front entrance of the home to incorporate a covered porch to welcome their guests."

Podvin expresses how pleased she is with the way the remodel turned out in working so closely with the couple. "They were a delightful family to work

with. I think together we accomplished the light and airy feeling they were looking for to make the home as welcoming and comfortable as it is."

Changes and Challenges

Bumping out the entry and another area in the front of the house allowed for the addition of a mud room. "This was a very practical and needed addition with three young children in the family," says the wife. Each child has a "locker" with an immediate place to put coats, backpacks, shoes, and odds and ends as they come in the door from the garage. Benches provide a place to sit down to take off shoes and boots.

One of the biggest changes in the remodel was the addition of the mammoth wrap around stone fireplace in the Great Room, a commanding visual element on the main floor. Its mix of travertine stone and brick above also add to the Great Room's elegance.

"The Great Room with its prow window walls, expansive ceiling height, beautiful views of Lake Superior, and

floor to ceiling stone fireplace immediately grab your attention," notes Bruckelmyer.

Kitchen Mix of Function and Beauty

The family spends a good part of their time at home in the kitchen, a central hub of the Great Room. The kitchen has white custom cabinetry (done by Bruckelmyer Brothers) with brushed nickel handles for a crisp, clean look.

The granite countertops in a rich chocolate are an elegant contrast to the white cabinetry. The couple had Riverside flooring experiment a bit to get the darkest chocolate stain for the flooring.

One of the wife's favorite aspects of the kitchen is a nearby walk-in pantry with ample storage and granite countertops for more work space. Another family favorite is the large screened-in porch off the dining area and kitchen where the kids love to eat and play.

Main Floor Master Suite

Putting the master suite on the main floor and the children's bedrooms upstairs helps to make it more secluded and



quiet. A deck off the master suite gives immediate access to the view and the outdoors in a very private space. The master bedroom is furnished with some antiques including a dresser from the husband's grandmother. A bubble tub, large walk-in shower, and ample walk-in closet space help make the master suite functional for the couple.

The Children's Floor

The upstairs is mostly "the kid zone." The boys' bedroom is all about cars and trucks with the "automotive motif" repeated everywhere including in a gas pump dresser. The boys' bathroom has the unique use of rocks as the floor in the shower.

A total feminine contrast is the daughter's room, a lavender and pink "suite" of her own, complete with a little crystal chandelier. Her bathroom is also "girly," done in pink, with lavender and white stripes.

An upstairs laundry room makes dealing with the children's laundry much easier. Their clothes and towels can go directly back to their rooms and bathrooms within just a few steps. An upstairs private study, entered through French doors, is an oasis for work and contemplation. The position of the large desk affords a great view of the lake.

Family Time

Downstairs is the place for family time in a comfortable room for movie watching, with a gas fireplace for cozy comfort on winter's eves. A corner table provides a place for playing games and doing puzzles for family entertainment.

A huge playroom with a girls' half and a boys' half gives the children a great place to play when friends and relatives come to visit. The lower level also includes a guest bedroom and bath, a huge storage area, and an additional laundry room.

Rooms With a View

"We were especially pleased with everything about this project; there is nothing to indicate that there was an existing structure here. From the elegant front entry to the impressive screened-in
