### **PROGRAM UPDATES:**

#### 1. SIXPENCE:

STUDENT/CASELOAD UPDATE: -Very successful program. Caseloads have stabilized-no one has dropped. Sixpence is partnership with GIPS and Headstart. They have home visits to share resources. To qualify, at least one parent needs to be a GISH student. We serve the child of the student as well as prenatal assistance. We also help the GISH student graduate and continue on to college; taking them on college visits, jobs site etc. Several program participants have gone into the CNA program which has doubled its enrollment at GISH and CCC. The program is designed to help the student and their child/children. We encourage/work with the dads as well. Any pregnant or parenting teen is invited to attend parenting meetings one time a month whether they are involved in the program or not. Some of our topics we have covered are birth control, sexually transmitted diseases shared by CNHD. Other events we have provided by the grant were a picnic in the park and parents night out at Olive Garden. Creating opportunities for relationships within our programs is important. We serve students and children based on private funding. Our 'stuff' gets them in the door; our incentives. We have no problem getting funding for food. Items that appeal to a teen parent would be things like make up bag, car care items, gift cards, diapers, bottles, books, lotion, soap, shampoo, deodorant.

  - Childcare. We often help the parents find childcare. The difficulty is getting a daycare to take children under 18 months. A suggestion would be to add the quality indicators checklist to our website.
  - We will work on getting a store to offer gift cards for gas. Susan Goodman will follow up on this item.
  - To expand the program we need referrals.
     Most referrals are by students. A concern is the lack of awareness within our building.
     We feel the counselors are unaware of what we do.
  - We need a counselor to connect with and/or work with our students. The students do not want to be given a list of providers; it is too overwhelming. They do not necessarily want a referral...just someone they can connect with who is a qualified provider.
