National Night Out Discussion	Crime Prevention Specialist, Butch Hurst, was present at the meeting. He has been a part of the National	
	Night Out program since its inception 20 years ago in Grand Island.	
	National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community	
	partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make neighborhoods a safer, better place to live.	
	National Night Out is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch and co-sponsored locally by the	
	Grand Island Police Department. This will be the 20th year the Grand Island Police Department has participated.	
	National Night Out will take place from approximately 6 to 10 p.m. on Tuesday, August 4 th .	
	The Police Department encourages neighborhoods, organized or unorganized, to take part in this	
	worthwhile community event. This could be the perfect opportunity for neighborhoods to organize a neighborhood association or watch group.	

	Our GGI committee will assist in the promotion of the event. With National Night Out designed to enhance the relationship between neighbors and law enforcement while bringing back a true sense of community it fits with the goals of this committee too.
	Last year a total of 15 Grand Island neighborhood groups participated in this event. Our group set a goal of 25 neighborhoods participating in 2015. The Police Department also set a goal of being "seen on scene" at all registered National Night Out events. In addition, the Fire Department will visit neighborhood gatherings upon request.
	Butch explained how folks are encouraged to register their event before Friday, July 31, so appropriate arrangements can be made. As part of the registration process, arrangements can be made to have neighborhood streets barricaded off during the time of the National Night Out awareness event.
	Registration forms are available at the Police Department, online on the front page of the city's website or by emailing Officer Hurst at churst@gipolice.org.
	It was also suggested that we explore the possibility of a Proclamation at a City Council meeting.
