MAKING THE RIGHT CHOICE: WORKPLACE TRANSPORT TRAINING

Training is not a one-size fits all solution; each individual and each company has different training needs. Searching for workplace transport training can seem quite daunting, but if we break the process down it's pretty easy to find what you're looking for...

The first question you have to ask yourself is do you want training to happen at your place of work or at a dedicated training centre? Let's look at the available options.

You have two options for training at your workplace; you could train a member of staff to provide in-house training or you could hire a commercial training provider to come to you to provide on-premises training.

In-house training:

- ✓ Save on travel time and expenses
- ✓ Ensure all relevant equipment will be right where you need it
- ✓ Ensure that training caters to your operational requirements
- ✓ You'll need to train an instructor
- You'll need to find space for theoretical and practical training facilities
- You'll have to lose some of your equipment and staff for training purposes
- ✓ You can't guarantee examiners will be impartial
- O Nor can you guarantee trainees won't be distracted by the working environment





On-premises training:

- There's no need to train an instructor & you will save on travel time and expenses
- You will have all the relevant equipment available & you can ensure training relates to your operations
- √ Instructors/examiners will be impartial
- You'll need training facilities for both theory and practical training
- You'll need to sacrifice equipment and staff for training purposes
- There is potential for distraction and interruptions

If you want to keep training separate from your working environment, you could send operators to a dedicated training centre:

- ✓ You don't need to train an instructor
- √ You can guarantee the impartiality of instructors/examiners
- ✓ It's the optimum environment for ensuring trainees are not distracted or interrupted by other work
- ✓ You can guarantee facilities for both theory and practical training
- You might have to fund travel
- Training will be informative, but not always directly relatable to company needs
- Despite a wide-range of materials, the centre might not have all the relevant equipment for example, the centre may use different types of lift trucks to those used at your place of work

Now you've chosen where the training will take place, you need to decide on whether this training will be accredited or non-accredited. But what does RTITB accredited training really mean?
